Interview Corner



The editor is impressed with lifestyles of the diversified group of Bridge members. Remember, your lifestyle, too, can appear in this column.

The editor interviewed a fascinating individual named **Fenton Harrison**. The editor was encouraged to interview this gentleman by another bridge player, **Gloria Brown**.

Bridge:

- He started playing bridge at a frat house at Duke. A 24-hour game (cut in and out); cards so tattered that shuffling was done in a bowl filled with talcum powder.
- **Herb McKeever** got him started on duplicate about 25 years ago. He had no particular mentor; he just tried to play against players that were better than he was and learned by his mistakes.
- He admires the talent of **Meg Klamp** and **Jim Mathis**.
- He remembers a time his partner opened a weak two and he had a Yarborough; they were doubled – down 5 (NV) for a high board! Opponents had a cold vulnerable slam (most bid and made 7)
- His goal for Unit 116 is that “Unit 116 should promote ‘greater harmony’ between the factions of the Unit.”

Personally:

- He married his high school sweetheart **Barbara Fries** in 1942 and lost her to Alzheimer’s in 2006.
- His children are:
 - Fenton Jr. – retired school teacher, Salem Va. Grandson John died of leukemia in 2003, Fenton III survives - very successful girls’ soft ball coach

with 5 state championships and many league championships.- lost first grandson to leukemia at age 25; grandson Fenton III now teaching English in S. Korea

- Elizabeth Ann – retired school teacher – Petaluma Ca. – Adarene and Olivia – neither married as yet.
- Janet – (Secor) housewife, E. Amherst – 3 grandsons – Thomas, Michael and Andrew
- Grace (Gori) classical singer with Washington National Opera; one son
- Was a trial lawyer with specialty in maritime law (proctor in Admiralty) Tried cases from Duluth to New York City. Admitted in Fed Appeals Courts for the 2nd, 6th and 7th circuits and 7 US District Courts –all courts in NY.
- He served a term as director of Trial Lawyers Assn of WNY. Lectured at national convention of Maritime Law Assn of US and served 13 years on Williamsville School Board.
- He coached LammPost American Legion baseball team (age 19u) for 50 years amassing 920 wins with over 50% of his boys going to play college ball (about 50 on scholarship) over 25 to pro careers and 2 reaching the major leagues; championships won in Legion Ball – AAABA and CEBA, as a result of which his peers elected him to the WNY Baseball Hall of Fame in 2005.
- He enlisted in USArmyAir Corps in fall of 1942. Commissioned in Feb. 1944 and assigned as a flying instructor for the French Air Corps at Craig Fld, Selma, Ala for next 14 months. For reasons only the Pentagon can understand, they felt he qualified to instruct French based on his 2 years of using a ‘pony’ in college French. Reassigned to 9th Air Corps in April 1945 training to support invasion of Japanese mainland (they found out he was coming and quit).
- He had a multitude of experiences in Court rooms, cases in front of such judges

as **Julius Hoffman** of Chicago 7 fame, being next case to argue in 6th Circuit behind **James Earl Ray's** appeal, baseball championships and too many experiences flying airplanes to recount except the one that stands out is the time he found himself in the middle of a thunderstorm with only a needle-ball-and airspeed for instruments. Only another pilot can appreciate that one!

- In his spare time aside from bridge, he enjoys model railroading, gardening (when he's home). He is a college basketball fan and baseball fan and political junkie.

The editor interviewed **Joyce Kindt**, a gracious lady who always extends a helping hand.

Bridge:

- She's played bridge for at least 20 years and took lessons from **Alan Greer**, a wonderful teacher for 4 years at Eldridge Club.
- Joyce also took lessons from **Chris Urbanek** and thinks she is a fantastic teacher.
- She served on Unit 116 Board for two terms – once as President and another as Vice President.
- Competed in Nationals – played in Las Vegas twice as well as the Regional in Gatlinburg three times. Plays in the winter months in Florida.
- Joyce wishes to thank her partners for the past 100 years and it is her hope to improve her game with them as they continue to play in the world of Bridge.
- When interviewed at **Marge Schomer's** Tuesday night game, this interesting hand came up. How would you have bid it? Dealer is West. Joyce played with **Judie Bailey**. Check with them for the final bid and what was made. The resulting contracts were: 7NT and 7D

John said, "I just made Life Master in Duplicate Bridge." He then described the local, state and national tournaments he competed in to earn the points for his precious card. John said with enthusiasm still clearly reflected in his voice, "There are these huge hotel rooms with many tables packed with hundred of players. Do you know playing a session of bridge requires the same level of concentration and energy that a surgeon requires performing a procedure."

With my curiosity enhanced, I discovered a 3x5 card on an Activity Bulletin Board of a Super-market I patronized. It had a single typed sentence

Alan was the *Pied Piper* of most Duplicate Bridge Players for many years in Western New York. Alan taught classes as well as directed sessions of Duplicate Bridge for beginners. He also offered advanced lessons and sessions of bridge for the advanced.

I've played bridge in Baltimore, Atlanta, Reno, Toronto and other cities on my way to Life Master status. Couple of decades ago it was estimated that it cost \$15,000 to travel and earn enough points to get that gold card. Obviously it was worth the effort.

However, getting in to Duplicate Bridge also resulted in my volunteering for Unit 116 Board. I always felt an obligation to return the opportunities to others that I was given by past members of the Board.

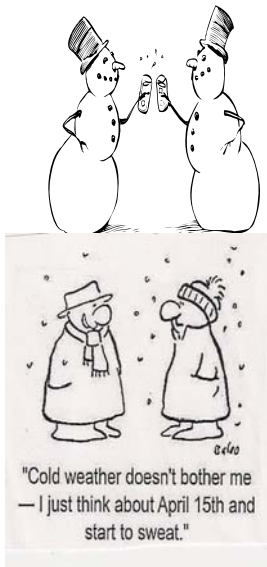

Land of fun

This hand was played in the BBC 299er game on Tuesday, December 30.

Dir: S	♠-QJT96	
Vul: E-W	♥-T754

Let S play in ♥s. Opening lead, ♠K won by the A. South can hold the defense to 5 tricks only by playing 3 rounds of ♣s and pitching 2 ♦s. Only 8 tricks for NS.

Let N play in ♠s. Opening lead ♥A. Then ♦A, ♦ to the K, ♥K, ♥ rough and again, the defense gets at least 5 tricks (and maybe 6). Only 8 (or 7) tricks for NS.

Let N play in NT. The defense starts ♦s and lets the ♦Q win the 2nd trick. Declarer can't get to the N hand for the ♠ finesse so she lays down the ace and *mirabile dictu*, makes 9 tricks.

In actual practice no one played in 2 of a major or any number of no trump. The NS top was scored by a pair in 4 hearts. Opening lead ♠K overtaken. Trick 2, the heart honors crash. NS +420. Dummy said, "Well played partner."

The Bridge "Gene-ie"

Some of you who know me personally know that I am in the midst of changing careers from clinical social work to library and information science. It's been a very fascinating, rewarding experience so far, and I certainly do not regret my decision. In fact, I think I embraced this decision wholeheartedly, especially from the angle of "learning something new." If we did the same things over and over (and over) again, parts of life might become a little boring and monotonous. So why not spice it up a little by learning something new! 😊

Besides learning how to teach people to find information of all sorts, library science has exposed me to the concept of a *blog*, which is short for "web log." A blog is an online website that functions much like a public journal. Typically they provide a commentary on a specific subject, but other times bloggers use them as online diaries.

So my curiosity got the best of me one day, and I decided to see if there were any bridge blogs in the WNY area. I performed a general search on Google and discovered the bridge blog of **Dale Anderson**, the gentleman responsible for updating the bridge section of Buffalo News. Dale's blog seemed more like an online diary of his trials and tribulations as a bridge player, and I found myself reading about his experiences of working toward

becoming a Life Master. Throughout his updates, Dale talked about many different bridge hands that were interesting or frustrating, and I thought I would incorporate one such situation into this article. Dale picked up this hand:

♠ 9
♥ J 10 7 5 2
♦ A K 8 6 3 2
♣ 2

Talk about a strange little hand! N/S Vul.; E/W Not Vul. - As West (dealer), he decided to pass. (Would you?) North opened 1♠, and his partner overcalled 2♣. South raised to 2♠, and Dale was up to bat. Dale knew his partner had to have a decent hand for her 2-level overcall, but, besides ♣s, did she have any red cards? He chose to bid 3♦, North bid 3♠, and his partner raised to 4♦, which was passed out. Here was pard's hand:

♠ A J
♥ K Q 6 4
♦ 9 4
♣ A 10 9 4 3

Dale cringed: it was obvious they should be in 4♥. Dale took 11 tricks for +150, but it was a complete bottom as a variety of scores were better for E/W.

So what went wrong? Well, nothing, really, except that he and his partner did not know a handy little convention called a Responsive Double. Heard of it? If not, that's okay – it falls into the family of "doubles" like the Takeout Double & Negative Double. Here is a VERY quick rundown:

1. LHO opened
2. Partner doubled or overcalled.
3. RHO raised opener's suit.
4. Your double as the 4th seat bidder should show support for the unbid suits.

Dale easily could have shown his hand in one bid: (1♠) - 2♣ - (2♠) - X! "I have ♥s and ♦s." This way they discover the ♥ fit.
